

Now we have almost 140 members who enjoy celebrating American holidays together, and participating in numerous groups and activities within the club. As members of FAWCO and the Landesfrauenrat, we work to strengthen ties with other clubs and women's organizations. In 2016 we are celebrating the 60th anniversary of the club's refounding.

What does it mean to women who left their passport countries to follow their love, family, or career; to those who made the leap to leave cozy, familiar places and land here in Hamburg – a city sometimes sunny, sometimes cloudy, and mostly fabulously rainy. Suddenly you are no longer alone, you are surrounded by incredible women of different ages and occupations, who welcome you warmly – and you realize you have both your language and culture – and this feels just like family! 60 Jahre American Women's Club

Verein engagiert sich für wohltätige Zwecke und hilft Amerikanerinnen beim Einleben in Hamburg

HAMBURG Unter dem Motto „Diamond Celebration“ steht der American Women's Club of Hamburg (AWCH) mit zahlreichen Veranstaltungen ganz im Zeichen des Jubiläumsjahrs. Beim großen Diamond Gala Event blickt der Club auf 60 Jahre Aktivitäten und ehrenamtliche Tätigkeiten und wohltätige Projekte zurück.

An der Hamburger Uni hatte die Studentin aus Missouri ihren „Mr. Wonderful“, einen chinesischen Kommilitonen, kennengelernt und eine Familie mit ihm gegründet. „Doch bald begann ich, mich klein und minderwertig zu fühlen“, erinnert sich Becky Tan. „Als alle es besser wussten, wie ich meine beiden Kinder zu erziehen hätte. Einschließlich meines Ehemanns, der inzwischen Chefarzt im Rissener Krankenhaus war. In meiner Not rief ich beim amerikanischen Generalkonsulat an, ob man mir einen Psychiater empfehlen könnte. Wir haben einen ganz tollen Psychiater für Sie, lautete die Antwort – den American Women's Club of Hamburg.“ Von den Ladies des AWCH erhielt die Amerikanerin dann endlich die Bestätigung, dass es genau so richtig sei, wie sie sel-

ber die Kinder erziehen wollte. „Mein Selbstwertgefühl kehrte zurück.“ 45 Jahre liegt die Episode zurück, seitdem ist Becky Tan Mitglied des AWCH. Heute ist die 75-Jährige Leiterin einer der zahlreichen Hobbygruppen des Clubs. Auf kinocritics.com und weiteren Foren besprechen sie und einige der Ladies neue Filme – 2.500 Kritiken sind es bis jetzt. Als Austauschschülerin ging Petra Jette Roitsch (40) für ein Jahr in die USA: „Ich habe mich

damals sofort in Land und Leute verliebt.“ Als sie zurückkam, litt sie unter Entzugserscheinungen. Beim AWCH verstand man genau, was sie vermisste. „Andererseits habe ich gelernt, Hamburg durch die Augen der Neuankömmlinge zu sehen und zu schätzen“, so die Kommunikationsleiterin. 1956 als American Women's Luncheon Club gegründet, verzeichnet der Club in seiner jetzigen Form 120 Mitglieder, davon rund zwei Drittel aus den USA.

Ein Drittel ist international besetzt, darunter auch von Deutschen wie Petra Roitsch. „Man hat hier viele gemeinsame Interessen – generationsübergreifend.“ Das jüngste Mitglied ist 28, das älteste 87 Jahre alt. Viel Service für wenig Geld: 39 Euro im Jahr kostet die Mitgliedschaft. Ein Newsletter informiert alle vierzehn Tage über sämtliche Aktivitäten: Weiterbildung, Hobbygruppen, Ausflüge, Sport- und Musikangebote. Der Club hilft mit Informationen zu

Integration, Steuern, Rechtsfragen oder Alltagsfragen wie Arzt, Kita oder ein nettes Café in der Nachbarschaft zu finden. Jedem Mitglied wird anfangs ein „Hamburg helper“ zur Seite gestellt, der ihm hilft, sich einzuleben, selbst bei so banalen Dingen wie amerikanisches Backpulver in der Hansestadt zu finden. Stark engagiert sich der gemeinnützige Verein für wohltätige Projekte, so auch „Herzkissen Hamburg“ für Brustoperierte in Krankenhäusern (das Wochenblatt berichtete). „Dann setzen wir uns zusammen, stopfen und nähen Hunderte von Kissen.“ Angedockt als Mitglied an das FAWCO, der Federation of American Women's Clubs Overseas, Inc., unterstützt der Verein das jeweils jährliche Zielprojekt. Diesmal mit 1.385 Euro aus der Gala-Tombola das Programm „Ausbildung – um Frauen und Mädchen durch Kenntnisse und Fertigkeiten in die Selbständigkeit zu führen.“

Wie alle Ladies hat sich auch Laura S. Langford für den rauschenden Gala-Abend im Rathaus-Restaurant Parlament in feine Abendrobe gehüllt. Seit 2015 ist die Ex-Bankierin Präsidentin, mit jeder Menge neuer Ideen. In der Hansestadt fühlt sie sich wohl: „Die Reeperbahn erinnert mich an meine Heimat Las Vegas.“

„You look gorgeous“ war ein Satz, der häufig zu hören war. Die Damen vom American Women's Club trugen alle besonderen Anlass zu feiern: das 60-jährige Bestehen ihres Clubs. Präsidentin Laura Langford begrüßte die rund 100 Gäste, zu denen neben Freunden und Ehemännern auch ein männlicher „special guest“ zählte – Richard Yoneoka. Für den neuen US-Generalkonsul und seine Frau Kathrin war es in dieser Funktion die erste gesellschaftliche Veranstaltung, die sie in Hamburg gemeinsam besuchten. Mit seinem Charme und Witz zog er so gleich die Aufmerksamkeit auf sich. Doch nicht nur der Süden gefällt dem Paar: „Hier in Hamburg fühlen wir uns jeden Tag etwas mehr heimisch.“ Sich wohl fühlen, darum geht es auch in dem American Women's Club, der von Amerikanerinnen gegründet wurde, die mit ihren amerikanischen Ehemännern nach Hamburg kamen, um hier zu arbeiten. „Die Frauen damals taten sich zusammen, um etwas zu erleben und die Stadt zu erkunden. Mittlerweile hat es sich ein wenig gewandelt: Nun gibt es viele Amerikanerinnen, die mit einem Deutschen verheiratet sind und für längere Zeit in der Hansestadt ankommen und gleichzeitig der eigenen Heimat verbunden zu bleiben“, erklärte Rebecca „Becky“ Tan, die schon seit 1971 Mitglied ist. Ein Grund, weshalb Tracy Moede beitrug: „Ich wollte, dass meine Kinder an amerikanischen Feiertagen teilnehmen können, denn die Mitglieder.“ Auch Frauen wie Petra Roitsch sind willkommen. Sie ist Deutsche, war vor 22 Jahren als Austauschschülerin in New Jersey. „Seitdem bin ich mit dem Land eng verbunden – und hier finde ich Gleichgesinnte.“ Darüber hinaus werden Spenden für den guten Zweck gesammelt. An diesem Abend ging der Tombolaerlös von 1385 Euro an ein Projekt der Dachorganisation FAWCO (Federation of American Women's Clubs Overseas).

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
